



# Medway Safeguarding Children Partnership

Multi-Agency Safeguarding Arrangements
December 2024









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#### **Section One - Introduction**

This document sets out how the Safeguarding Partners in Medway coordinate their safeguarding services and how they will work together with relevant organisations and agencies to safeguard and promote the welfare of children.

The Children and Social Work Act 2017 and its accompanying guidance Working Together to Safeguarding Children 2023 place a shared and equal duty on the statutory safeguarding partners to make arrangements to work together to safeguard and promote the welfare of all children in a local area.

The MSCP priorities will be reviewed in 2025 and these arrangements will be updated and published, in line Working Together to Safeguard Children 2023 guidance as appropriate.

## **Safeguarding Partners**

As defined in Working Together to Safeguarding Children 2023 the Lead Safeguarding Partners (LSPs) are represented as follows:

The MSCP LSPs are known as the Accountable Officer group and meet twice-yearly and chair the group on a rotational basis. The 2024-2025 chair is Paul Bentley, Chief Executive, Kent and Medway ICB.

In Medway the Accountable Officers have delegated their responsibilities for the safeguarding arrangements to the Executive Group, known in Working Together to Safeguarding Children 2023 as Delegated Safeguarding Partners (DSPs) as follows:

The three DSPs chair the Executive group on an annual rotational basis and Simon Wilson, Assistant Chief Constable, Kent Police is the chair for September 2024-September 2025.

The Accountable Officers have equal and joint responsibility for local safeguarding arrangements, which is underpinned by equitable and proportionate funding including through any contributions from relevant agencies. The Executive group have the responsibility and authority for ensuring full participation with the safeguarding arrangements. Although the Accountable Officers have delegated their responsibilities to those named above, they remain accountable for any action or decisions taken on behalf of their respective agency.

The area covered by the arrangements is defined by the Medway Council local authority boundary. Partners to these arrangements may have responsibility for services outside this area due to either their organisational boundaries overlapping other local authority areas or because they have responsibilities for adults with care and support needs in another area. Some partners may also need to work to another area's arrangements, for example during a case review commissioned by another area, and where this is the case, the Safeguarding Partnership will help facilitate communication with other areas and engagement by partners.

Representatives should be able to promote the effectiveness of the partnership through their responsibility and accountability for the services their agencies deliver to children and through their ability to influence the effectiveness of their agency's contribution to multi-agency safeguarding.

The Executive group will review the relevant agencies of the Partnership annually.

## **Section Two - Purpose**

The Accountable Officers in Medway are committed to a partnership model that focuses on continuous learning and improvement with a clear 'line of sight' on frontline safeguarding practice. Safeguarding partners will promote a shared commitment to work together to improve outcomes for children.

The MSCP will support, enable and challenge each other to work together to ensure:

- The Partnership has a clear, shared vision for how to improve outcomes for children across all levels of need and all types of harm
- When a child is identified as suffering or likely to suffer significant harm there
  is a prompt, appropriate and effective response to ensure the protection and
  support of the child
- Organisations and agencies are challenged appropriately, effectively holding one another to account
- The voice of children and families combined with the knowledge of experienced practitioners and insights from data, provides a greater understanding of the areas of strength and/or improvement within arrangements and practice



- Information is sought, analysed, shared, and broken down by protected characteristics to facilitate more accurate and timely decision-making for children, families and adults with care and support needs to understand outcomes for different communities
- Effective collection, sharing and analysis of data, enables early identification of new safeguarding risks, issues, emerging threats, and joined-up responses across relevant agencies
- Senior leaders promote and embed a learning culture which supports local services to become more reflective and implement changes to practice
- Senior leaders have a good knowledge and understanding about the quality of local practice and its impact on children, families and adults with care and support needs

# **Section Four - Funding & Resources**

#### Working Together to Safeguarding Children 2023

The LSP should agree on the level of funding needed to deliver the multi-agency safeguarding arrangements. This includes consideration of business and analytical support, independent scrutiny, infrastructure, and core functions including local children safeguarding practice reviews, multi-agency training and learning events.

It is the responsibility of the LSP to ensure that adequate funding is allocated and spent in line with agreed priorities. Funding contributions from the statutory safeguarding partners should be equitable and agreed by the LSP. Funding for the arrangements should be reviewed on an ongoing basis to ensure that they can meet the financial needs of the arrangements.

The funding should be transparent to children and families in the area, and the individual contributions of safeguarding partners and relevant agencies should be clearly set out in reporting.

The funding is used to directly support the work of the partnership including the business unit, independent scrutiny, conducting learning reviews and training programme.



Partners also give resources 'in kind' to support the functioning of the partnership including chairing and participating in sub-groups, task and finish groups, conducting reviews, audits and analysing and submitting data.

Partners plan to review the budget and contributions in 2025-2026.

## **Section Five - Reporting**

The Safeguarding Partners will publish a yearly report which will set out what has been achieved through the partnership, how effective arrangements have been in practice and what action has been taken because of child safeguarding practice reviews. The report will also include:

- Evidence of the impact of the work of the safeguarding partners and relevant agencies, including training, on outcomes for children and families from early help to looked-after children and care leavers
- An analysis of any areas where there has been little or no evidence of progress on agreed priorities
- A record of decisions and actions taken by the partners in the report's period (or planned to be taken) to implement the recommendations of any local and national child safeguarding practice reviews, including any resulting improvements
- Ways in which the partners have sought and utilised feedback from children and families to inform their work and influence service provision
- A section by the Independent Scrutineer

The report will be published on the Medway Safeguarding Children Partnership website (<a href="www.medwayscp.org.uk">www.medwayscp.org.uk</a>) and a copy sent to the Child Safeguarding Practice Review Panel and the What Works Centre for Children's Social Care.

In line with Working Together to Safeguard Children 2023 the yearly report will also include a review of restraint and safeguarding within the Secure Estates in Medway. The Independent Scrutineer will oversee the completion of the annual review. A copy of the report will also be sent to the Youth Justice Board.

# **Section Six - Independent Scrutiny**

## Working Together to Safeguarding Children 2023

The function of the independent scrutiny role is to provide safeguarding partners and relevant agencies with independent, rigorous, and effective support and challenge at both a strategic and operational level. Independent scrutiny should drive continuous improvement and provide assurance that arrangements are working effectively for children, families, and practitioners. It should also consider learning from local child safeguarding practice reviews, national reviews and thematic reports. The decision on how best to implement a robust system of



independent scrutiny is to be made locally, and LSPs should be assured that the system in place leads to objective and rigorous analysis of local arrangements.

The Safeguarding Partners engage two independent scrutineers whose focus is as follows:

#### Independent Scrutiny for Multi-Agency Arrangements

The Independent Scrutineer will provide a scrutiny role around:

- Learning from and action plans for Local Child Safeguarding Practice Reviews
- How the partnership uses data; and
- Outcome of audits both multi agency and single agency

The Independent Scrutineer will review the MSCP annual report and will comment on this in a section of the report.

The Independent Scrutineer will attend the Executive Group.

At all times the Independent Scrutineer will give particular attention to ensuring that the voice of the child is at the heart of all aspects of scrutiny.

#### Independent Scrutiny of Secure Estate

The Independent Scrutineer provides scrutiny role in relation to safeguarding arrangements within the secure school in Medway, including:

- Chairing the quarterly Secure Estate Quality Assurance meetings,
- Maintaining regular contact with key individuals involved in safeguarding (e.g., Local Authority Designated Officer, Head of Safeguarding in the establishments, other parties)
- Undertaking periodic visits to Oasis Restore Secure School.

The Independent Scrutineer will oversee the completion of the annual 'Review of Safeguarding and Restraint' in the establishment and will report the outcome of this to the MSCP Executive.



## **Section Seven - Learning and Improvement**

The MSCP is a learning organisation where 'learning is a habit not a goal' and supports the development of Medway professionals.

The MSCP have a Quality Assurance Framework, with the PMQA and Learning Lessons sub-group having responsibility for its implementation. The framework focuses on scrutiny and challenge to partners and on the impact for children and families. The assurance activity includes:

- A multi-agency dataset to monitor performance.
- Multi agency and single agency case file audits.
- Local Child Safeguarding Practice Reviews.
- Section 11 Audits.
- Independent Scrutineer Evaluation

**Multi Agency Audits -** The MSCP undertake themed multi agency audits through the case file audit group. The Executive group agree a schedule of themed audits to monitor performance, and to identify good practice and multi-agency learning. The learning lessons subgroup have responsible for monitoring the action plans that come from the audits and driving change.

**The use of data and intelligence –** The Safeguarding Partners and relevant agencies will provide data on a quarterly basis which will be scrutinised by and be subject to regular review by the Performance Improvement and Quality Assurance subgroup. The dataset will include national and local comparator figures alongside an analysis of the data.

**Local Child Safeguarding Practice Reviews –** On being informed of a notifiable incident, the MSCP will undertake a Rapid Review in line with published guidance in Working Together 2023, to make decisions and to inform the National Child Safeguarding Practice Review Panel about the decision to undertake a local child safeguarding practice review or not. The Rapid Review will be undertaken by a panel nominated by the safeguarding partners. The Independent Scrutineer will be consulted as part of the decision-making process.

Where a decision is made to undertake a local child safeguarding practice review, an independent reviewer will be appointed. Reviews will be published on the MSCP website. Exceptions to publication will be discussed and agreed with the Child Safeguarding Practice Review Panel.

The Learning Lessons subgroup will be responsible for the effective dissemination of learning from local and national child safeguarding practice reviews and for monitoring the implementation of recommendations from reviews to ensure lessons are learnt, improvements are sustained, and they impact on improving outcomes for children. The MSCP will facilitate learning sessions to ensure the learning from national and local child safeguarding practice reviews as well as multi agency audits is readily accessible to practitioners.



**Local Practice Alerts and Referrals for Review –** To promote learning culture the MSCP believes it is important that professionals and organisations protecting children review the quality of their services and learn from their own practice and that of others.

Good practice should be shared so that there is a growing understanding of what works well. When things go wrong there needs to be a thorough and unbiased analysis of what happened and why, so important lessons can be learnt and services improved to reduce the risk of future harm to children.

To ensure that children are safeguarded properly by agencies working effectively together, the MSCP supports a "Partnership practice alerts" and "Referrals for case review" process. These processes support the MSCP in celebrating good practice, challenging practice outside of expected standards and procedures and to learn from experiences.

## **Section Eight – Multi-Agency Training Arrangements**

Working Together to Safeguarding Children 2023

Joint functions of delegated safeguarding partners include the provision of appropriate multi-agency safeguarding professional development and training.

The Safeguarding Partners are committed to ensuring a consistent approach to multiagency safeguarding training to ensure the workforce has the knowledge, understanding and skill to safeguard Medway children. As part of this commitment the MSCP provide an annual multi-agency safeguarding children training programme structured around the following three areas:

- Safeguarding practice
- MSCP priorities
- Themes from local child safeguarding practices reviews and multi-agency audits.

The programme includes e-Learning, virtual and in person training delivery. The MSCP also works with relevant agencies to promote training provision in more specialist areas such as Prevent.




#### Section Nine - Thresholds

Children's needs vary at different times and in different circumstances and Intervention needs to be based on a clear and consistent understanding of need. This requires all practitioners, across the partnership including those providing services to adults with children, to understand their role in identifying emerging problems and to share information with other practitioners to support early identification and assessment. In Medway we constructed a continuum of need to identify the right support at the right time. The diagram below summarises this. We recognise that at different times families' needs may change and so they may move between levels. The continuum of need is therefore not a linear approach but a cycle, illustrating how needs and support can change.

#### **Continuum of Need**

The level of support can change in line with the level of need.

# **Section Ten – Challenge and Escalation**

Working Together to Safeguarding Children 2023

Safeguarding partners and relevant agencies must act in accordance with the arrangements for their area and will be expected to work together to resolve any disputes locally.

Generally, there is a good working relationship between agencies, but occasionally situations arise when workers within one agency feel that the actions, inaction, or decisions of another agency do not adequately safeguard a child. Disagreements may arise around:

- Levels of need/ thresholds
- Roles and responsibilities
- Progressing plans
- Communication

Effective working together depends on an open approach and honest relationships between agencies. All professionals have a duty to act assertively and proactively to ensure that a child's welfare is the paramount consideration in all professional activity. Therefore, all professionals must challenge the practice of other professionals where they are concerned that this practice is placing children at risk of harm.

The MSCP has a <u>Challenge and Escalation Policy</u> to provide professionals with clear routes to escalate concerns so that agencies can agree a way forward. The policy will set out clear routes to escalate professional concerns where there are professional disputes or where the actions, inactions or decisions of another agency may be getting in the way of keeping a child safe.
